### Flood Risk Regulations Coming

The Province of Nova Scotia is requiring all municipalities create regulations around development in flood risk areas. The Municipality of the District of Lunenburg will soon be reviewing options for how it will limit development in flood risk areas and will be seeking resident feedback.

We will be engaging residents between **October 12 and January 12**. If you'd like to learn more or ask questions prior to completing the survey, staff will hold numerous Open Houses, pop-up events, and virtual meetings throughout the Municipality.

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**Mayor's Corner**

It's been a wonderful summer here on the South Shore. I especially enjoyed attending the Big Ex, and seeing so many residents out having a good time.

This issue of Municipal Matters is full of important news and information about municipal initiatives. One important initiative is the work we're doing to improve equity, diversity, and inclusion in MODL.

Unfortunately, systemic and persistent forms of discrimination have created communities that don't work for everyone. Our communities are experiencing growing inequities in resources, access, and power. Aboriginal peoples, women, racialized people, people with disabilities, people living in poverty, youth, seniors, newcomers, and LGBTQIA2S+ communities face barriers when accessing health, employment, and housing. When we do nothing to address these inequities, these issues grow and become more difficult to resolve.

Municipalities are the level of government closest to people. When a municipality works for those who are most at risk of exclusion, we work for everyone. Equity and inclusion create more sustainable communities, where people from all walks of life have the right to, and can participate fully in, social, economic, political, and cultural life.

Currently, we are investing in education for staff and Council, allocating budget to staff resources (individually and regionally), and supporting the community through funding and sponsoring events, education, and other initiatives.

Events such as African Nova Scotia flag raisings, and Pride Picnics and Hikes, send a message of inclusion, acceptance, and celebration. They are important pieces of the larger puzzle, which must also include changes to systems, policies, procedures, and more.

I look forward to seeing positive changes in our community to make it more welcoming for all.

## 2022 Boundary Review Underway

Council is elected to make decisions for the Municipality about services, policies, and programs. Councillors are elected from polling districts and are required to make decisions that are in the best interests of the Municipality as a whole and not just the needs of the polling district they represent.

The Municipal Government Act requires every municipality to conduct a study in 2022 on the number and boundaries of polling districts in the municipality, their fairness and reasonableness and the number of Councillors. After the study is completed, each municipality must apply to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board to confirm or alter the number of Councillors and boundaries of polling districts.

The Municipality held the first phase of public consultation opportunities, seeking feedback on the size of Council, this summer. This fall, we'll seek resident input on proposed changes to electoral boundaries. Feedback received from public consultations will be included in the final Boundary Review Committee recommendation, which will be provided to Council later this year. ## Pride in the Common

It's easy to forget that just over 50 years ago, homosexuality was a crime in Canada. Now, sexual orientation and gender identity are protected against discrimination under federal law and the Nova Scotia Human Rights Act.

Pride Month is a celebration of this resilience and progress in the LGBTQIA2S+ community, as well as a reminder of the work that remains to be done. LGBTQIA2S+ is an acronym for Lesbian, Gay, Transgender, Bisexual, Queer and/or Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, Two-Spirit, and the countless affirmative ways in which people choose to identify.



Pride Month is celebrated every year, in June. However, this past June, in the municipality, was different than prior years. June 25, 2022, marked the FIRST Pride event put on by the municipality; Pride in the Common, in partnership with Lunenburg PRIDE – Lunenburg Co. They are a non-profit organization providing advocacy, awareness, and resources for LGBTQIA2S+ individuals and their allies in Lunenburg County, NS.

The first activity at Pride in the Common was a group hike on the accessible Indian Brook Falls route, which is approximately 2.2km, providing a lovely visual of the Indian Brook waterfalls. After the scenic walk, everyone was provided refreshments and gathered around for a picnic. Kids and adults alike played and socialized around the picnic areas, naturalized playground, and interactive art park.

From playing catch with family and friends, to teaching their kids washer toss, smiles were shining the whole day. To finish off the event, Councillor Kacy DeLong read LGBTQIA2S+ stories to the kids—the parents enjoyed story time just as much.



It might seem like a small gesture, but events like these are just one more way we can contribute to building a more equitable community that is safe and welcoming for everyone. We are proud to be working towards an inclusive community and support the Pride movement. Bringing visibility to the Pride movement is one way to help to increase education and understanding among adults and youth in our community.

## Art on the Trail

The Art on the Trail initiative was started in 2017 by the Municipality's Active Living Coordinator. The vision is to have a local artist design, plan, create, and install public art on municipal trails. Art on the Trail can serve a variety of purposes. It can illustrate the identity of the trail itself or the identity of the surrounding communities. It can also stimulate the mind and the senses, allow for rest or contemplation, or encourage participation in outdoor physical activity. Furthermore, public art installations elevate the practical infrastructure of a trail to a space cherished by the community.

In July 2022, MODL announced their third Art on the Trail installation within the municipality. Located on the Dynamite Trail, High Tide was imagined and constructed by Erin Philp, a local artist, woodworker, and shipwright. Much of her work revolves around playful reinterpretations of nautical vessels and themes that draw on her love of sailing and Maritime history, as well as the natural beauty of the local coastal landscape.



High Tide is a collection of three sculptures mounted in trees along an inlet of the Narrows Basin. The sculptures are based on the classic 'Lunenburg Dory' design and were constructed using lofting lines from the Fisheries Museum of the Atlantic. The hardy Lunenburg dory was historically used in combination with Grand Banks schooners, like the Bluenose, to fish the Atlantic Coast and is an integral part of the Maritime history and fishing traditions of the South Shore of Nova Scotia.

Gliding through the trees, the High Tide collection of dories takes this recognizable form, constructed using traditional methods and locally sourced materials like pine, hackmatack, and black locust. It elevates the vessels into a new and surprising relationship with their environment, highlighting and celebrating these simple, yet enchanting boats.



The Art on the Trail installations provide trail users a renowned appreciation for the creativity in their community, the beautiful trails, the outdoor spaces within the Municipality, and the benefits of being active outdoors.

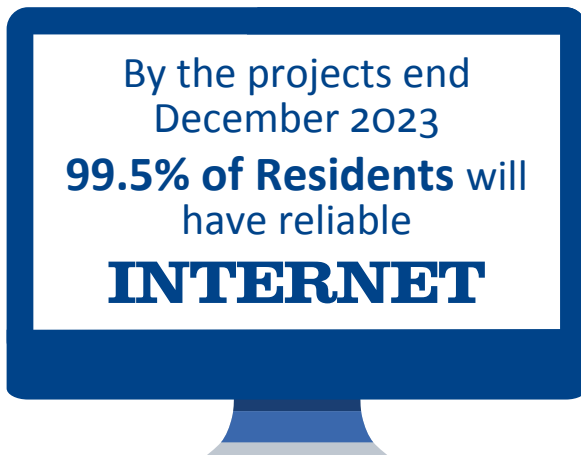
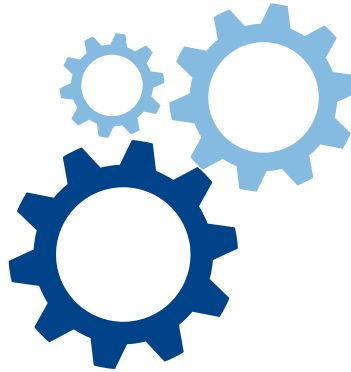

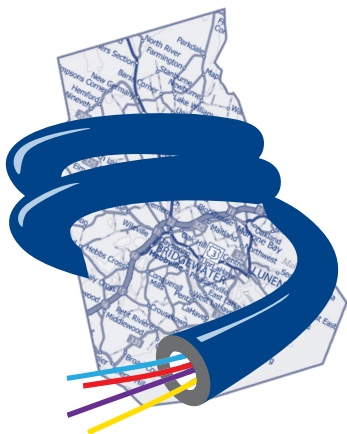


## Satellite Rebate Program

For remaining under-served homes and businesses where no wired or wireless Internet solution has been found, you are eligible for a rebate of up to \$1,000 for a qualifying satellite Internet service.

The program has now expanded to residents and business owners who are not expected to gain access to wired or wireless Internet until after December 31, 2023. The expansion is expected to help an additional estimated 2,200 homes and businesses.

## Attention Business Owners!

MODL will soon launch a new Business Retention & Expansion (BR+E) survey. The information from the survey will be used to plan future economic development activities focused on the top priorities of local businesses.

Consulting firm Deloitte LLP will be working with municipal staff to review the completed surveys to get an understanding of the local business climate. Participation in the survey will be by random selection. If your business is contacted, we urge you to help us by answering the surveyor. Calls will be made between September 12 and October 14. ## Emergency Recovery—the Importance of Insurance

In the case of a house fire, wildfire, car accident, or hurricane, insurance is the best way to recover following the unexpected events.

Whether you are a homeowner, business, tenant, landlord, or recreational owner you can suffer devastating losses due to an emergency. Insurance isn't meant to cover predictable events like regular home maintenance, it is there to help you cope with the financial burden of unpredictable events that are sudden and accidental.

Some insurance tips:

- Not all policies are equal. Coverage options vary, some may be less expensive however compare the policies to ensure your property is adequately covered.
- If you are evacuated from your home and need to stay at a hotel and get food and clothes, most insurance policies provide Additional Living Expense (ALE) coverage that can assist with these additional costs. Ask your insurance company in advance what they need when you file a claim. Do they need receipts that you must keep throughout the year, a video of your belongings and property, replacement items purchased for reimbursement? Knowing this in advance helps prepare for a claim.
- Review your insurance at least annually or anytime you make a substantial change to your property, like a renovation. This helps ensure you have appropriate and adequate insurance coverage for your home, business, and family needs.
- Some coverages like sewer back up and overland flood are optional; check your policy or speak with your insurance rep if you want to add these to your policy.
- Keep copies of your policies and insurance company claims contact information in your emergency kit.
- The Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC) has information on home, auto, and business insurance. Contact IBC at 1-844-227-5422 or visit [ibc.ca](http://ibc.ca).

Definitions of common types of insurance:

**Homeowner:** Covers the dwelling, outbuildings, contents, and personal liability of your family. Consider the rebuilding costs, replacement value over the years, and coverage for all your belongings.

**Businesses:** Protects you from losses that may pose a significant threat to your business operations. There are many different factors to consider for businesses such as coverage, deductibles, and policy limits.

**Tenants:** Covers the cost to replace your belongings due to theft, fire, or water damage after a loss. The landlord insures the building, you insure your belongings. Insurance also protects you if someone gets hurt or someone else's property is damaged because of your negligence.

**Landlords:** Landlord insurance can help cover the cost of damage to your property as well as replace rental income.

**Recreational Owners:** Seasonal or secondary property insurance is different than home insurance. Seasonal properties are primarily used for recreation at certain times of the year. Don't forget to consider the sheds, boats, and recreational vehicles as well.

## Green Cart Changes

**Plastic-type compostable bags will no longer be accepted in the green cart as of November 1, 2022.**

Line your mini bin with newspaper, flyers, boxboard or paper liners instead. Put wet food, meat, and bones in a cereal box. Your cart can be lined with a paper yard waste bag or a bit of cardboard.

**Paper coffee cups, plastic-lined paper food packaging, and waxy drink cups will no longer be accepted in the cart as of November 1 either.** They go in the garbage.

## Fall Wood and Metal Collection Reminder

**Wood and metal pick up will take place on your regular collection day between September 19 and 30.**

Items up to 1.8 m (6 feet) long and 100 kgs (220 lbs) will be collected. Each household may put out a *combined* volume of wood and metal measuring 4 cubic metres (5.2 cubic yards). This can be measured as 2 m (6.5 feet) x 2 m (6.5 feet) x 1 m (3.2 ft). Remove spikes and brackets over 15 cms (6 in.) from wood pieces.

Wood and metal can be dropped off at the Community Recycling Centre, 908 Mullock Road, Whynott's Settlement. A fee is charged for wood, metal is free.

Reminder: fridges, freezers, dehumidifiers, air conditioners and water coolers are not collected curbside unless professionally drained and stickered. Drop these items off at the Recycling Centre, free of charge. Questions? Call (902) 543-2991 or visit [communityrecycling.ca](http://communityrecycling.ca).
