Solar Power Coming to the Municipal Services Building

The Municipal Services Building is undergoing a solar energy project, adding approximately 257 solar panels with a total anticipated wattage of 100 kilowatts.

This project has been solely funded by MODL and executed by contractor, Natural Forces Solar. This initiative aligns with our Local Climate Change Action Plan 2030.

In the coming years, solar panel installations are also planned for the New Germany, Conquerall Bank, and Cookville Wastewater Treatment plants.

“A low-carbon community is not a destination we reach with a plan, but a journey we embark on by taking action. We’re excited at the ability for these solar projects to build a sustainable future, and create a resilient community that will thrive for generations to come,” said Mayor Carolyn Bolivar-Getson.

**Mayor's Corner**

Our province can see harsh winters and hot summers, making it important to ensure our homes are energy efficient. Residents can now take advantage of two programs that help improve their home energy efficiency and reduce their energy bills.

The first program is the Municipal Clean Energy Financing Program, a form of Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE). This program was made possible with a partnership between the Municipality and The Clean Foundation (a non-profit environmental organization).

The program provides low-interest municipal loans to eligible homeowners to perform energy efficient upgrades, such as insulation, energy-efficient doors and windows, water heaters, heat pumps, and solar energy systems. After applying, experts from the Clean Foundation will evaluate the home and create a detailed list of recommendations to maximize energy savings.

With the updated terms in effect from May 4, 2022, the Municipality now offers financing of up to \$20,000 at a lending rate of 2% for the clean energy upgrades and the ability to spread installment payments over a period of 15 years, repayable through charges attached to their property. Lump sum payments can be made at any time without penalty.

The second program is the Provincial Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP), which provides rebates to eligible Nova Scotians to help pay their heating bills. The program received a \$100 million funding increase, resulting in a higher rebate of \$1,000, up from \$200, and expanded eligibility criteria. Households with a net income of up to \$85,000 are now eligible to receive the rebate. The application deadline is March 31, and eligible applicants can expect to receive their rebate within two to eight weeks.

Both programs help residents combat rising home heating costs, and the PACE program specifically helps families access funding for the upfront costs of retrofitting their homes to increase their homes efficiency, feel warmer, and save money.

Active Living Strategy

A refresh of MODL's Active Living Strategic Plan was recently approved by the Province of Nova Scotia and MODL's Council. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), active living is a way of life in which physical, social, mental, emotional, and spiritual activities are valued and are Integrated into daily living.

Some of the previous initiatives that have come from the Active Living Strategy include, but are not limited to:

- Hike badges
- Rural walking signs
- Art on the Trail
- Playboxes
- Drop-in women and girl swims

The new Active Living Strategic Plan provides information on the strategy development process; background information including an overview of the Let's Get Moving (the provincial physical activity strategy), the importance of equity and inclusion, and the findings from the citizen survey; the strategic plan vision, mission, and values; the strategic directions and associated goals, objectives, and actions; and next steps. Below is a brief summary of the directions and goals for active living within MODL:

Strategic Direction 1: Communication and Promotion

Goal: Community members who value active living and are motivated to move more everyday

Strategic Direction 2: Community Capacity and Leadership

Goal: A network of leaders and partners across MODL who support active living opportunities

Strategic Direction 3: Natural and Built Environments

Goal: A sustainable, connected, and safe network of trails, parks, open spaces, waterways, and recreation facilities within MODL.

Strategic Direction 4: Social Environments and Inclusion

Goal: Accessible and inclusive opportunities for active living that provide opportunities for social connection within MODL.

Many people contributed to the development of MODL's Active Living Strategic Plan. The contributions made by partners in the community have been invaluable. The ongoing support and dedication of all these individuals will be essential in helping to move the strategic directions and associated objectives of the strategic plan forward and to help to ensure the vision and goals are achieved.

Introducing Lunenburg County Wheels

The Senior Wheels Association, which has been providing transportation for seniors and individuals with disabilities in Bridgewater and the surrounding areas for more than 30 years, is doing more than just changing its name to Lunenburg County Wheels (LC Wheels) and enlarging its clientele. The prearranged door-to-door service's management structure will also change, moving from a board of volunteers to a full-time Operations Manager.

Darion Lantz, the newly appointed Manager, is currently in charge of expanding ridership in the current service area from elderly and those with disabilities to now include all residents. The area that was before only accessible from Bridgewater and 7km outside of the town limits will eventually expand as far as Voglers Cove, Hemford, and New Germany. LC Wheels plans to soon cover the entire western Lunenburg County.

The hope with the expansion is to give all residents the opportunity to access important appointments, local trips, and time with their families. "The volunteer Board and Senior Wheels drivers have been helping people stay connected to their community for over 30 years. My hope is that by expanding our service we can help more people live where they want to live by maintaining their connections," said Lantz.

Lunenburg County Wheels currently operates an 8-passenger accessible bus that will soon be supplemented by a 7-passenger minivan that was recently acquired with funding from the Community Transportation Network and a grant from MODL. The Nova Scotia Department of Public Works provides the bulk of the money for the expansion, a four-year trial project.

Lantz stated that aside from the expansion of ridership and service area, the organization's only other planned change is the moving from a voluntary donation-based system to implementing a fare for rides.

LaHave Straight Pipe Replacement Program Complete!



It is with great excitement that we announce the completion of the LaHave Straight Pipe Program. Our commitment to ensuring a straight pipe-free Lower LaHave River has been fulfilled, and we could not have done it without the cooperation of residents.

In 2017, the LaHave River Straight Pipe Replacement Program was launched with the goal of removing all straight pipes that run along the river. The Municipality developed a Wastewater Management District, which requires all properties within the District to have an approved system in place. If a property owner did not have an approved system, they could apply to the Municipality for a replacement. The Municipality would then manage the design and installation of an approved on-site septic system for the property.

Over the past five construction seasons, 357 on-site sewage disposal systems have been installed. The Municipality conducted 884 inspections to locate the properties with straight pipes. The LaHave Straight Pipe Project was funded one-third by the provincial government, one-third by the federal government, and the remaining one-third was covered by participating property owners. The majority, but not all, of the program costs were eligible for two-thirds cost sharing from the federal and provincial governments.

The anticipated deadline for the completion of this program was March 31, 2023, and the Municipality is pleased to announce that we have successfully met the objective of removing all straight pipes from the LaHave River before the deadline and within funding limits. The final cost of the program will be reflected in the budget. The Municipality would like to express gratitude to all the property owners who participated in the program.

Notice to TIPP Customers on Monthly Installments

Do you participate in the Municipality's Tax Installment Pre-Payment program (TIPP)? TIPP is a service provided by the Municipality to automatically debit your bank account a monthly amount to pre-pay your tax bill when it comes due.

Spring is a good time to review your property assessments from the province and determine if you need to adjust your monthly payment. It is your responsibility to ensure your monthly payments either cover the entirety of your upcoming tax bills or ensure that you pay the difference between your monthly TIPP and the balance owing when you receive your tax bill.

Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP)



The Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP) is now open for applications to help more Nova Scotians combat rising home heating costs this winter. The program has received a \$100 million funding increase, resulting in a higher rebate amount of \$1,000, up from \$200, and expanded eligibility criteria.

Households with a net income of up to \$85,000 are now eligible to receive the rebate. This represents a substantial increase from the previous income thresholds of \$29,000 for single-income households and \$44,000 for family-income households. This expanded program will help more people and provide more support than ever before, ensuring that residents of Nova Scotia can keep their homes warm during these winter months.

Those who have already qualified for the HARP rebate this year do not need to reapply, as they will receive an additional payment to bring them up to the new rebate amount of \$1,000. If a previous application was denied, the application is under review and eligible applicants will receive the full rebate if they meet the new eligibility criteria. The deadline for the applications is March 31, and eligible applicants can expect to receive the rebate within two to eight weeks.

It is important to note that the expanded HARP program is only available this winter, and that to be eligible, applicants must pay for their own heating. Sources include oil, electricity, coal, wood, wood pellets, propane, or natural gas. Protecting Yourself From Phone Scams



Scams have become increasingly prevalent in this digital age, and scammers are getting more creative with their tactics.

These scams can come in many forms, from unsolicited phone calls and texts to social media messages and emails. Knowing how to protect yourself from these scams is essential to avoid falling victim to these fraudsters.

Some common phone scams involve receiving a text message stating that you need to pay a fee before your Canada Post or FedEx package can be delivered, or that your taxes or government payments are available. These messages will often include a link that you are directed to click on to make a payment or enter your banking information. This is a scam, and the link may lead you to a fake payment portal where scammers can steal your payment information or personal details.

Other popular phone scams are lottery scams, where you receive a call or a text message claiming that you have won a significant amount of money in a lottery. However, to claim your prize, you must first purchase a gift card or pay a processing fee. No legitimate lottery will require you to pay a fee or purchase a product to claim your winnings. Some scams go as far as to claim a child or grand child has been arrested, and that you must pay an amount to free them.

To protect yourself from phone scams, there are several red flags that you should be aware of. These include unsolicited phone calls or text messages, offers that seem too good to be true, requests for personal information, and demands for payment upfront. Scammers will often create a sense of urgency to make you act quickly and without thought. If you recognize any of these signs, you should proceed with extreme caution and take the time to verify the legitimacy of the offer.

Never give out personal information or make a payment until you are certain of the source and legitimacy of the caller or emailer. Never click on links or download attachments from unsolicited messages.

Spring Cleaning Tips

Doing some spring cleaning in the coming weeks? Here's how to get rid of some of the clutter:

Unwanted Clothing: Do a clothing swap with family and friends, donate to a local charity or drop clothes off in a donation bin. Cut some up for use as cleaning rags. Clothing that can't be reused go in clear garbage bags during curbside garbage collection.

Electronics: Drop off at the Lunenburg Regional Community Recycling Centre at 908 Mullock Road, Whynotts Settlement, free of charge. To review: recycleMYelectronics.ca/ns.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW): Residents can drop off HHW at the Lunenburg Regional Community Recycling Centre at 908 Mullock Road, Whynotts Settlement, free of charge. Items include rechargeable and lithium batteries, paint, propane tanks, old gas, motor oil and diesel fuel, pesticides, fridges and freezers. Complete list of items: communityrecycling.ca.

Food Waste & Expired Foods: Food waste and expired foods go in your green cart. Remove food from packaging and cans. Contain food waste in paper leaf bags, paper shopping bags, or cereal boxes to keep your green cart tidy. Rinse empty glass, metal, and plastic food containers, then place in your blue bag for recycling.

Bulky Landfill Items: Put two large landfill items out for collection on regular pick up days, throughout the year. Each item can measure up to 6 feet long and weigh 220 lbs. Items include upholstered furniture, sinks, toilets, rolled up carpet, plastic lawn furniture, vacuum cleaners, and kids' toys.

Wood and metal items will be collected during a special pick up on your regular collection day between September 18 - 29, 2023. These items are not collected bi-weekly. For more information, visit communityrecycling.ca.
